This years' Annual Parish Award was given to Orvie Ellis. Orvie is a long-time parishioner of St. Andrew's. She has been active in numerous church activities since 1964, when her family moved to Winnipeg. Orvie was one of five leaders that established the Junior Auxiliary in 1964.

She was an active member of the Altar Guild for numerous years. She was my mentor when I was recruited for Altar Guild, and I have always looked to her for advice in everything St. Andrew's. She was encouraging, patient, and instilled in me a respectfulness for the duties performed by Altar Guild women. When Orvie retired from active Altar Guild duty she continued laundering and ironing linens on her rotation. She assisted with the sewing of the complete set of our blue hangings used yearly in the Church. This set includes many pieces—antependium, veil, choir offering pouches, burse, and bookmarks. Her handiwork is also seen in the form of the crosses that adorn the Altar cloth made by members of the Altar Guild.

Orvie was also an active member of the ACW and contributed and worked at the Parish Bazaar for many years. Many have enjoyed the baking and needlework pieces she donated. She is also a quilter and has had a hand in the many beautiful quilts that have been created for the Bazaar raffle over the years, by the Creekside Quilters.

Orvie was active in helping to put Christmas hampers together for many years. She was a parish phoner for different activities in the Church. She was also a member of "Friends of St. Andrew's" - a group that caters to funeral receptions, among other things. She would work the receptions and donate baking. Wherever Orvie was needed, she was willing to go. She worked quietly behind the scenes, going about her duties with no need for fanfare. She has been a valued member and asset of St. Andrew's for nearly 60 years.

This is a much-deserved recipient of our Annual Award—an award that is long overdue. Thank you Orvie for all you have contributed to St. Andrew's over the years. Your dedication, experiencer, calm manner, and the genuine care and concern you put into all that you do has contributed to making our Church a wonderful place to worship and carry out our faith-based ministries. St. Chad's Memorial Chapel

St. Chad's history will be memorialized with the creation of the St. Chad's Memorial Chapel. The chapel will be in the church proper on the level between the Sanctuary and the basement lounge area. It is a quiet and reverent space to house the original altar from the Christian Centre chapel. It will also feature our Chapel cross, Acolytes Candles, donated in memory of Ted Wakeman, Bible, Prayer Shawl Wall Hanging, and Memorial Leaves. Additional items may be added once the altar is installed.

St. Chad's Moving Update

Our lease with Messiah Lutheran terminates April 30th. The final transfer of St. Chad's possessions will occur during the last week of April. A moving company will deliver the larger, heavier items to St. Andrew's Woodhaven.

Some of our Holy Hardware has already been delivered to St. Andrew's, as has been the Tabernacle, the Eternal Candle in memory of Dionne Hunter, BAS books, Common Praise Hymn Books, choir robes, and our library of choral music. The keyboard is currently covered and stored in the Parish Hall. It will be transferred to the Choir Room adjacent to the Basement Lounge when the final move occurs. Duplicate items will be examined, and the surplus will go to the Diocesan Office for distribution to churches in need of such items.

Financial Update regarding the final \$500,000 payment

The Roman Catholic Dioceses has advised that the final payment will be made per the agreement. It will be transferred to the Diocese of Rupert's Land in October.

DECOLONIZING THE MAP—RE-CENTERING INDIGENOUS MAPPINGS

What does "decolonize" mean?

Decolonize means free (an institution, sphere of activity, etc.) from the cultural or social effects of colonization, and eliminate colonial influences or attitudes from, i.e. "The museum is closing some galleries as it embarks on an effort to decolonize the institution".

Why is decolonizing Canada important?

Decolonization through mapping is about cultural, psychological, and economic freedom for Indigenous peoples (First Nations, Inuit, and Metis) to accomplish the goal of achieving Indigenous Sovereignty. This is the right and ability of Indigenous peoples to practice self-determination over their land, cultures, and political and economic systems.

In Canada, decolonization is usually discussed in terms of the relationship between Indigenous and Non-Indigenous peoples. This is absolutely associated with the Truth and Reconiliation Commission of Canada's final report and Calls to Action.

Colonization has taken place in Canada through years of oppression and genocide of Indigenous peoples, and was perpetuated by structures of white supremacy, heteropatriarchy, racism, and capitalism.

For Indigenous peoples, decolonization begins with learning about who they are, and recovering their culture and self-determination.

How are Indigenous peoples in Canada accomplishing the above statement?

Mapping is a powerful tool that holds stories. Mapping was a widespread and well-developed art amongst Indigenous people in what is now Canada.

Indigenous navigational maps were usually drawn on the ground or in the snow. Sketched from memory, they were also verbal descriptions. Indigenous maps required the successful traveler to rely entirely upon memory. Indigenous peoples were trained in this task from childhood!

Indigenous peoples are reclaiming their lands and waters by documenting their traditional place names, creating their own mapping icons, plotting their sacred sites in their own languages, and ultimately sharing their stories.

Indigenous peoples of Canada are not only decolonizing the map, they are indigenizing it!

The Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (PWRDF) is the Anglican Church of Canada's agency for sustainable development and relief. With the support of Anglicans across Canada, PWRDF partners with or-

ganizations working to increase healthy pregnancies and births, reduce gender inequality, relieve hunger, and break the cycle of poverty in the world's most vulnerable communities. Against a backdrop of climate change, PWRDF strives to address the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals for 2030.

The P stands for **Primate** (the head of the Anglican Church of Canada), but it also stands for our **Partners** in Canada and around the world, **People-centred development** and for the **Parish volunteers** who engage Canadians with our partners' work. Program focus areas include Preventative Health, Food Security, Empowering Women, Indigenous Programs, Humanitarian Response, and Accompanying Refugees.

PWRDF supports partners in Canada and throughout the world who are implementing grassroots solutions relevant to the needs and situation of their local communities. This approach empowers communities to take a leading role in their own development, which ultimately moves them closer to a place of sustainability and self-sufficiency. PWRDF believes this grassroots, capacity-building approach is crucial in fostering a culture where communities are empowered to build their own success and well-being.

PWRDF partners are drawn from Anglican churches, ecumenical organizations, and community-based groups.

ANGLICAN GROW HOPE 2023

Grow Hope 2021 raised almost \$25,000 for PWRDF food-related projects in Haiti. Proceeds came from Chris Lea's canola crop, and donations from "Truckloads of Hay Sale", developed by Lea's for livestock producers in Manitoba. The funds were matched 3:1 by the Federal Government.

Grow Hope 2022 had a new farm partner, Fred Wiebe, and his family near Springstein, MB. He grew 15 acres of soybeans to support the Grow Hope program. PWRDF supports his input cost to approximately \$300 per acre. The Wiebe Family did all the work, sold the soybeans, and donated the proceeds to PWRDF through the Canadian Food Grains Bank (CFGB). The funds were used to support a project in Kenya, helping to provide lifesaving food assistance for 3000 households (15,000 people) in drought-devastated areas.

Grow Hope 2023 is already in the planning stages. The Wiebe Family once again has agreed to participate in the Grow Hope project. St. Andrew's will be joining the Grow Hope initiative in the spring. Watch for details to follow as our local PWRDF finalizes plans.

Let us continue to "grow hope" in the challenging times currently confronting the world.

MEET OUR NEW FOSTER CHILD—HANTZ-MICHEL JOSEPH



Hantz-Michel Joseph is nine years old and living in the North East of Haiti. The Plan International Project Unit Manager from this area in Haiti writes that since July, violent unrest has paralyzed the country with barricades and burned vehicles blocking main roads, making it near impossible to transport people, goods, etc.

Haiti is the 4th-hungriest place in the world with 4.3 million people in a serious crisis situation. A crisis response program has been designed by Plan International to address the issues of Food Security, Child Protection, Water, Sanitation, Hygiene, and School Closures. These resources are expected to reach 95,000 people with 90% of them being sponsored families.

Hantz-Michel and his family are apparently doing well, and none of these humanitarian efforts would be possible without the support of sponsors like our St. Andrew's parishioners. When you head over to the Hall for Coffee Hour, drop some spare change or bills in the mug dedicated to Hantz-Michel, and your donations will offset the \$50.00 per month which we send to support Hantz-Michel and his community.

TURKISH AND SYRIAN EARTHQUAKE RELIEF (PWRDF)

In the early morning of February 6th, a 7.8-magnitude earthquake happened near the Turkish/Syrian border. More than 5000 people were killed and thousands more injured, trapped beneath the rubble. Rescue and recovery work is continuing.

The ACT Alliance has many members working in the area who have been responding to humanitarian needs. "As the scale of the disaster continues to be discovered, ACT members are checking in with their own staff teams, conducting rapid needs assessments, and are already working to provide life-saving supplies to impacted people," says the ACT Alliance.

PWRDF will immediately allocate \$35,000 to the ACT Alliance to support its members working in the area. PWRDF is also accepting funds to support this appeal.
